



## Investment in Building Construction, October 2025

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The estimated investment in building construction<sup>1</sup> (seasonally adjusted) in Yukon for October 2025 was \$49.3 million, a decrease of \$10.4 million, or 17.4%, compared to the figure for October 2024 (\$59.7 million). Compared to the figure for September 2025 (\$33.3 million), the October 2025 investment in building construction in Yukon increased by \$15.9 million, or 47.7%.

Nationally, investment in building construction<sup>1</sup> (seasonally adjusted) in October 2025, increased 5.7% compared to the figure for October 2024 and decreased 0.5% compared to the figure for September 2025.

On a **year-to-date basis** (January through October of 2025), the total value of investment in building construction in Yukon was \$394.5 million. This represents an increase of \$35.5 million, or 9.9%, compared to the same period in 2024 (\$358.9 million); investment in residential building construction (\$176.0 million) decreased by \$19.5 million and investment in non-residential building construction (\$218.5 million) increased by \$55.0 million.

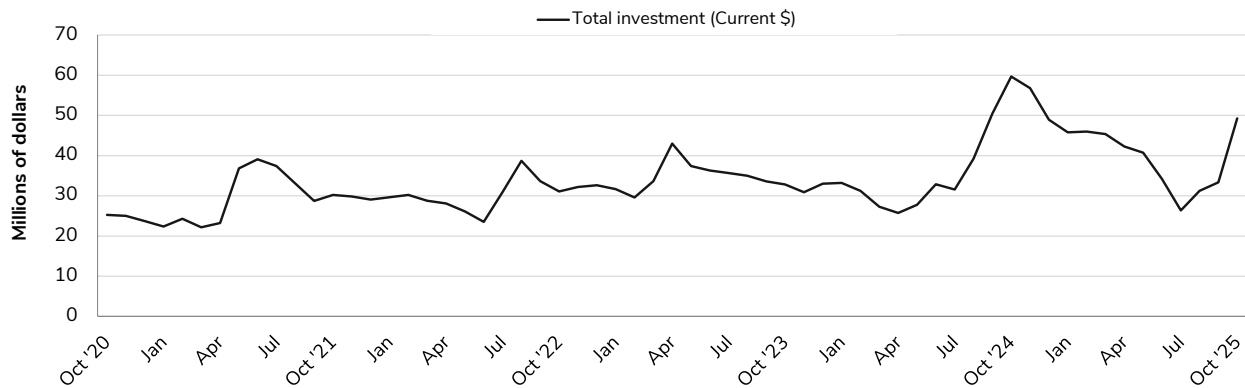

**Note to readers:**

- Unless otherwise stated, this release presents seasonally adjusted data with current dollar values, which facilitate month-to-month comparisons by removing the effects of seasonal variations.
- Data are subject to revisions based on late responses, delayed construction start dates for large projects, methodological changes, classification updates, price index updates for constant dollar series, benchmarking and adjustments to ad hoc macroeconomic events. Seasonally adjusted data in this release have been revised back to January 2017.
- In 2024, there were delays in issuing building permits by the City of Whitehorse. These delays caused a reduction in the total value of building permits up to mid-August 2024. As a result, the value of building construction in 2024 presented in this release may be lower than usual. From mid-August 2024, the City of Whitehorse began clearing backlogs of building permit applications, which may have affected the year-over-year fluctuations in the value of building construction in this release.
- Following a period of very high price growth of building materials between 2020 and 2023, Yukon Bureau of Statistics (YBS) introduced an additional analysis of constant dollar values (2017 = 100). This analysis provided comparisons of year-over-year change adjusting for price fluctuations that affected current dollar values during this period. From January 2025, YBS is no longer providing this additional analysis of constant dollar values as growth rates in these prices have returned to pre-pandemic patterns.
