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# PENSIONS

## **Canada Pension Plan (CPP) Retirement Pension**

The CPP Retirement pension is a monthly payment to people who have contributed to the Canada Pension Plan. The amount of your CPP benefit is determined by the contributions you made during the time you were employed. CPP benefits normally are payable the month after your 65th birthday, however you may choose to begin as early as age 60 or as late as age 70. If you start receiving your pension earlier, the monthly amount you will receive will be smaller. If you decide to start later, you will receive a larger monthly amount. There is no benefit to wait after age 70 to receive the pension

## **CPP Disability Benefit**

The disability benefit is a monthly payment you can get if you:

- are under 65
- have contributed enough to the Canada Pension Plan
- have a mental or physical disability that regularly stops you from doing any type of substantially gainful work
- have a disability that is long-term and of indefinite duration, or is likely to result in death

## **CPP post-retirement disability benefit**

If you currently get the monthly CPP retirement pension, you could receive the Canada Pension Plan post-retirement disability benefit if you:

- are 60 to 65
- contributed enough to the CPP
- have a mental or physical disability that regularly stops, you have a disability that is long-term and of indefinite duration, or is likely to result in death
- have been receiving the CPP retirement pension for more than 15 months or become disabled after starting to receive the retirement pension

## **CPP Children's benefit**

If you receive a Canada Pension Plan (CPP) Disability Benefit, your dependent children under 18 may also be eligible for a CPP Children's benefit. This benefit provides monthly payments to help support your children.

## **FOLLOWING A DEATH**

### **CPP Survivor's pension**

The survivor's pension is a monthly pension paid to the legal spouse or common-law partner of a deceased contributor.

To qualify for the survivor's pension, you must:

- be legally married to a deceased CPP contributor
- be the common-law partner of a deceased CPP contributor

According to the Canada Pension Plan (CPP) legislation, a common-law partner is a person of either sex who has lived with you in a conjugal relationship for at least 1 year.

### **Death Benefit:**

The death benefit is a one-time payment, payable to the estate or other eligible individuals, on behalf of a deceased CPP contributor.

To qualify for the death benefit, the deceased must have made contributions to the Canada Pension Plan (CPP) for at least:

- one-third of the calendar years in their contributory period for the base CPP, but no less than 3 calendar years, or
- 10 calendar years

The children's benefit is a monthly benefit for dependent children of a deceased contributor.

To be eligible, the child must be either:

- under age 18, or
- under age 25 and in full-time attendance at a recognized school or university

The child must also be:

- the natural child of the contributor
- a child adopted “legally” or “in fact” by the contributor while under the age of 21
- a child “legally” or “in fact” living with and in the custody and control of the contributor while under the age of 21

Once a child turns 25, they are no longer eligible for these benefits. For any of the CPP Survivor benefits to be payable, an application must be made, and the deceased contributor must meet the specified contributor requirements.

**If you move, you should notify Service Canada immediately of your new address, even if your payments are being deposited to your bank account. This will allow Service Canada to send you important information like your tax slip (T-4).**

**You can notify Service Canada’s voice messaging service of your change of address 24 hours a day, 7 days a week by calling, free of charge, service at 1-800-277-9914. Persons with hearing/speech impairments using TDD/TYY devices may call 1-800-255-4786.**

**You can also use the My Service Canada Account online service to view and update your Old Age Security (OAS) and Canada Pension Plan (CPP) address, telephone number and payment destination.**

# Old Age Security (OAS)

The Old Age Security pension is a monthly payment you can get if you are 65 and older.

In most cases, Service Canada will be able to automatically enroll you for the OAS pension if sufficient information is available. Service Canada will inform you if you have been automatically enrolled.

You can receive the Old Age Security (OAS) pension even if you have never worked or are still working.

If you are living in Canada, you must:

- be 65 years old or older
- be a Canadian citizen or a legal resident at the time we approve your OAS pension application
- have resided in Canada for at least 10 years since the age of 18
- The amount of the Allowance that you receive depends on your marital status and your previous year’s income (or in the case of a couple, your combined income).

## **Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS)**

The Guaranteed Income Supplement (GIS) is a monthly payment you can get if you are 65 or older.

The Supplement is based on income and is available to Old Age Security pensioners with low income. It is not taxable.

In many cases, they will let you know by letter when you could start receiving the first payment. They will send you this letter the month after you turn 64. In other cases, you may have to apply.

You may be able to get this benefit if:

- you are 65 or older
- you live in Canada
- you receive the Old Age Security (OAS) pension
- your income is below \$21,768 if you are single, widowed, or divorced
- your income plus the income of your spouse/common-law partner is below:
  - ◆ \$28,752 if your spouse/common-law partner receives the full OAS pension
  - ◆ \$52,176 if your spouse/common-law partner does not receive an OAS pension
  - ◆ \$40,272 if your spouse/common-law partner receives the Allowance

## **Guaranteed Income Supplement Allowance**

The Allowance is a non-taxable payment you can get if:

- you are age 60 to 64
- you live in Canada
- your spouse or common-law partner is eligible to receive the Guaranteed Income supplement (GIS)
- your combined annual income is less than the maximum annual income threshold for the Allowance.

You should apply for the Allowance 6 to 11 months before you turn 60. If you are already 60 to 64 years old you should apply as soon as possible.

If you were in receipt of the Allowance and your spouse or common-law partner has passed away, you will be automatically converted to the Allowance for the Survivor.

**Allowance for the Survivor**

The Allowance for the Survivor is a monthly payment you can get if:

- you are age 60 to 64
- you live in Canada
- your spouse or common-law partner has died and since their death you have not remarried or become a common-law partner to another person
- your annual income is less than the maximum annual income threshold for the Allowance for the Survivor.

You will have to apply if your spouse or common-law partner has passed away and you are between the age of 60 and 64. Do not apply earlier than 11 months before you turn 60.

## **Yukon Senior's Income Supplement (YSIS)**

This is a benefit paid to senior citizens of the Yukon by the Yukon Territorial Government. To be eligible you must be receiving one of the following federal pensions: GIS, Allowance or Allowance for the Survivor. This pension, which is up to a maximum of \$288.61 per month, and will be paid automatically if you meet the above requirements. There is no application for this benefit. Benefits are based on your Income Tax Return. Once in receipt of YSIS, a yearly income must be completed or benefits suspended.

## Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP)

Many seniors have paid into an RRSP while working. You may continue to accumulate your savings in an RRSP until you are 71 years of age. You must close your RRSP by the end of year when you turn 71. At which time you must withdraw them or convert your RRSP to a Retirement Income Fund (RIF) or use them to purchase an annuity. The institution that holds your RRSP can provide detailed explanations of these options.

## Private Pensions

Private pensions available from your employer should have a number of options. They also may have several conditions placed on the amount and method of payment. Your employer will be able to provide you with detailed explanations of your pension plan so that you and your family are well taken care of after retirement.

**Superannuation**

Superannuation is a pension plan administered in accordance with Federal Legislation. People who are contributors under the different sections of this legislation are those in the RCMP, Military Service, Federal and Territorial employees and those who are employees of designated Crown Corporations. Should you have any questions or concerns regarding entitlement or benefits please contact your local Personnel Office, or the Superannuation Branch. Please ensure that you have your Superannuation Number at hand when you call.

# GRANTS & FINANCES

## Pioneer Utility Grant (PUG)

The Pioneer Utility Grant (PUG) assists Yukon seniors with the cost of heating their homes regardless of whether they own or rent. Seniors who are living in social housing or getting a rental subsidy are not eligible for the grant. Heating can be oil, electric, wood, propane or wood pellets. Yukoners must apply every year.

### Who can apply for this funding?

- Yukon seniors who are 65 or older in the year of the grant, *and*
- A Canadian citizen or permanent resident who has lived in Yukon for a minimum of 12 months, *and*
- Yukoners who live in the Yukon a minimum of 183 days every year.
  - ◆ 3 months of the 183 days must be during the winter months defined as January, February, March, October, November and December.

Yukoners on an extended vacation during the first 6 months of the year must delay submitting their application. For example, if you travel south on vacation for the entire month of February, you cannot apply until November 1. You would need January, March and October to count as your winter months.

Principal residence means the normal place of residence in the Yukon, of an applicant.

Applications are accepted between July 1 and December 31.

***Incomplete applications or applications received after December 31 will not be accepted.***

**City of Whitehorse Seniors Utility Charges  
Rebate**

The City of Whitehorse offers a rebate on fees paid for water, sewer and garbage collection. You are eligible for the City Utility Grant if:

- You are 65 years of age or older.

*Or*

- You are 60 years of age or older and the surviving spouse of a person who was eligible for the rebate prior to his or her death. *And*
- You pay City of Whitehorse utilities

The amount of benefit is a maximum of \$500. Utilities must be paid in full to be eligible for the grant. Proof of age is required for first-time applicants. Applications must be made directly to the City of Whitehorse on or after October 15 of each year but no later than December 31st in the year for which the grant is requested.

*Incomplete applications or applications received after December 31 will not be accepted.*

# Homeowners Grant (property tax)

The Homeowner’s Grant is a grant for Yukon residents who own and occupy their own home.

If you, or the co-owner, are 65 years of age or older, the grant amount is equivalent to 75% of the general taxes to a maximum of \$500 per household.

If you or the co-owner are under 65 years of age, the grant amount is equivalent to 50% of the general taxes to a maximum of \$450 per household.

In order to qualify for the Homeowner’s Grant you must:

- Own and occupy your residence since January 1st, or 184 days of the current property tax year (Jan 1st to Dec 31st).
- Have your property taxes paid in full.

There are several ways to receive the grant and are as follows:

- If you pay your own taxes, the grant may be credited at the time the taxes are paid.
- If a mortgage company pays your taxes, the grant may be credited at the time the taxes are paid. This application must be submitted by June 10th of the current year.
- If you or your mortgage company pay the taxes and you wish to receive your Home Owner’s Grant cheque, you are required to submit your application requesting the cheque be forwarded to you.

Applications are accepted from the time of the current year tax payment until Feb 15 of the following year.

The seniors' property tax deferment program allows you to postpone paying your property taxes. You can defer up to 75% of the assessed value of your home. You can defer all or part of your home's annual property taxes minus the Home Owners Grant for the current or subsequent taxation year.

- You must be 65+.
- You must live outside of municipalities in areas where the Government of Yukon is the taxation authority.
- You must own and live in your own home.

- A home or mobile home you own and in which you normally reside. This will be the same property on which you claim the Homeowners Grant.
- If you have a home under an agreement to purchase or a long-term Crown lease, you may qualify.

- Second homes such as cottages, cabins and rental properties are not eligible.

## **Goods and Services Tax Credit**

The Goods and Services Tax (GST) Credit is a tax-free quarterly payment that helps individuals and families with low and modest incomes offset all or part of the GST that they pay.

To receive the GST credit quarterly payments, people must file their income tax and benefit return and complete the goods and services tax/harmonized sales tax (GST/HST) credit application on the first page of the return.

## **Employment Insurance Benefits (EI)**

Employment Insurance (EI) provides regular benefits to individuals who lose their jobs through no fault of their own (for example, due to shortage of work, or seasonal or mass lay-offs) and are available for and able to work, but can't find a job.

EI sickness benefits can provide you with up to 26 weeks of financial assistance if you can't work for medical reasons. You could receive 55% of your earnings up to a maximum of \$668 a week.

You must get a medical certificate showing that you're unable to work for medical reasons and for approximately how long. Medical reasons include illness, injury, quarantine or any medical condition that prevents you from working.

## **Employment Insurance Caregiving Benefits**

EI caregiving benefits provide financial assistance while you're away from work to care for or support a critically ill or injured person or someone needing end-of-life care. You could receive 55% of your earnings, up to a maximum of \$668 a week.

As a caregiver, you don't have to be related to or live with the person you care for or support, but they must consider you to be like a family member.

Three types of caregiving benefits:

- Family caregiver benefit for children – providing care for critically ill or injured person under 18 - up to 35 weeks payable

- Family caregiver benefit for adults - providing care to critically ill or injured person 18 or older – up to 15 weeks payable.
- Compassionate care benefits – a person of any age who requires end of life care. – up to 26 weeks payable.

You can receive benefits during the 52 weeks following the date the person is certified by a medical doctor or nurse practitioner to be critically ill or injured or in need of end-of-life care. You can take the weeks of benefits within this timeframe either all at once or in separate periods.

The weeks of benefits can be shared by eligible caregivers, either at the same time or one after another.

## Social Assistance Program

Health and Social Services is a Territorial Government Department that offers financial assistance to residents who are in need.

Assistance may be granted either on an on-going basis or to help overcome an emergency situation. You may apply for the following forms of assistance:

- Assistance with medically related expenses which are not covered under the Extended Health Care Benefits program for seniors, Yukon Pharmacare, or the Chronic Disease List.
- Assistance with special needs. Consideration may be given on an individual basis for assistance with unexpected expenses which the senior citizen cannot afford to pay.
- As a funder of last resort, eligibility is determined by income and financial resources of the applicant.

# **YUKON HEALTH SERVICES**

## **Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan**

To receive coverage under the Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan (YHCIP) you must be registered with the plan.

If you have just moved to the Yukon from another province or territory and are planning to settle here, you should register with the Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan as soon as you arrive. There is a 3-month waiting period to qualify for YHCIP.

The health plan of the province or territory you have just left should cover your hospital and physician expenses for up to three months.

## **Chronic Disease and Disability Benefits**

The Chronic Disease and Disability Benefits program provides coverage for Yukon residents who have a chronic disease or disability and are under the age of 65. Your prescriber applies to the program for you. In the application, they will include your chronic condition and any needed medications or equipment.

## **Pharmacare and Extended Care Benefits**

### **Extended Health Care Benefits**

The Pharmacare and extended health-care benefits programs assist registered seniors with the cost of:

- prescription drugs;
- dental care;
- eye care; and
- medical-surgical supplies and equipment.

### **Eligibility**

You must be:

- registered with the Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan (YHCIP); and
- a Yukon resident age 65 or over.

If you are registered with Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan, you

will receive a pharmacare program application form in the month you turn 65. Contact the office if you have not received your form.

You're also eligible if you're:

- a Yukon resident registered with YHCIP;
- married to a Yukon resident who is 65 years of age or older.
- aged between 60 and 64

### **New Yukon resident**

If you're a new Yukon resident, it takes 3 months for your YHCIP coverage and seniors benefits to begin. To receive your health care, you must:

- Apply for the Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan.
- Apply for Pharmacare and extended health benefits at the same time as when you apply for the Health Care Insurance Plan. In person: 4th floor, 204 Lambert Street, Whitehorse. Our office is open Monday through Friday, from 8:30 a.m. to 5 p.m.

We'll issue you with a card once you finish the registration process.

### **Why would your benefits stop?**

- If you're away from the Yukon for more than 183 consecutive days.
- Your benefits stop the date you permanently move out of the territory.

### **Pharmacare benefits**

The Pharmacare card confirms your eligibility for all insured physician, hospital and seniors' benefits. The program is the insurer of last resort. You have to pay your costs 1st, then you'll be reimbursed.

If you receive health insurance benefits through your employer or a 3rd-party insurance agency:

- 1st, submit your claims to these insurers; and
- do not submit the same claims to both Pharmacare and your employer or 3rd-party insurance agency.

## Pharmacare coverage

Benefits under the Pharmacare program include partial or 100% coverage.

### Medical surgical supplies or equipment

You may be able to get:

- walking aids;
- hand inhalers;
- artificial eyes and limbs;
- respiratory equipment;
- commodes; and
- manual wheelchairs.

### Hearing aids

- 1 hearing aid is allowed in a 4-year period.
- Repair and adjustment of 1 hearing aid with a 12-month warranty.
- No charge for adjustments.
- Batteries are not covered.

### Dental care

*(Coverage is limited to \$1,400 in any 2-year period.)*

- The plan pays for dentures or rebases once in a 5-year period to a maximum of \$1,400
- If you present your Pharmacare card to the dentist, they'll submit the bill directly to the health-care plan for payment.

You'll have to pay any amount over the \$1,400 limit. If you need high-cost procedures, you should sign the appropriate application form available through your clinic. Then, have your dental clinic submit the form to the Pharmacare program to get prior approval for the procedure.

### Eye examinations and glasses

- The plan may pay for 1 eye examination, new lenses and a maximum of \$100 toward the purchase of frames once every 2 years.
- Benefits do not include the repair of glasses.
- The purchase of tinted or contact lenses is not covered.

**Prescription medications**

If you do not have the Pharmacare card with you when making a purchase, you'll be charged for the cost of drugs. The program may refund this amount, but you must submit the original receipt.

The Pharmacare program will pay the total costs of the lowest priced generics of all prescription drugs. You can find a list of drugs and costs in the Yukon Pharmacare Formulary. The cost includes the dispensing fee.

**Non-Prescription Drugs and Goods**

The program covers some non-prescription drugs and goods:

- compounds used in the control of heart disease, nitroglycerin, preparations, digoxin and other digitalis-related products;
- analgesics used for the symptomatic relief of arthritic conditions; and
- insulin syringes.
- anti-inflammatory drugs;

**What Pharmacare does not cover**

Pharmacare does not cover the cost of products that do not require a prescription, such as:

- vitamins.
- patent medicines.
- personal care items.
- medical or surgical supplies.
- laxatives.
- antacids; and
- most medicines used in the treatment of colds.

## **Medical travel with Yukon Insured Health**

Medical travel covers both in-territory and outside travel for medical services within Canada.

For more information, contact your care provider or Insured Health and Hearing Services at (867)667-5209.

To be eligible:

- you must be enrolled in or be eligible for the Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan (YHCIP);
- the medical service must be provided by a licensed medical practitioner and considered essential to your health;
- the service must not be available within your home community;
- you must start your travel in the Yukon;
- a doctor, nurse or other health care professional must provide an application; and
- the Medical Travel Program must approve the application.

Depending on your situation, you, your spouse and family may be covered by other acts or programs. For example, if you:

- are injured or become ill at work, you'd deal with the Yukon Workers' Compensation Health and Safety Board;
- have First Nations or Inuit Status, you have coverage under non-insured health benefits for First Nations and Inuit.
- are a member of the Canadian Armed Forces or the RCMP;  
or
- are a federal government employee, you have medical travel coverage through your work.

## **What does the program offer?**

If the medically necessary Insured Health service you require is not available in your community, they may cover travel for you to receive that service. This could include mileage reimbursement at the rate of 30 cents per kilometre, and the most appropriate and cost effective flights to get to your appointments.

They also cover in-territory travel for the following non-insured services:

- Hearing Services;
- Mental Wellness and Substance Use Services;
- Child Development Services; and
- Outpatient Therapy Services at Whitehorse General Hospital.

When you're on approved medical travel, you're eligible to claim a subsidy to assist with costs incurred while on medical travel:

- You and any approved escorts will receive a travel subsidy of \$78 for same day travel.
- If you need to stay overnight as an outpatient while on medical travel, you will receive a \$155 travel subsidy starting on the first day (up to 16 days). Any approved escorts will receive a travel subsidy of \$78 per day.
- If you are admitted to a facility as an inpatient, your approved escort may be eligible to receive a travel subsidy of \$155 per day.

## **Travel escorts**

Some patients are not able to travel without help. Your medical practitioner may request an escort to accompany you. These requests will be approved if specific criteria are met. We'll cover the travel costs of approved escorts.

# Non-resident, visiting Yukon or travelling?

If you are not a resident of Yukon and you need medical travel during your stay in the territory, you will be responsible for all medical travel costs. The medical travel program will only organize medical travel for visitors and non-residents needing emergency medical travel to a health centre or Southern hospital. Visitors needing medevac, ground ambulance or hospital transfer will be invoiced for the full cost of these services.

Likewise, if you are outside the Yukon on personal travel, we do not cover the cost of air or ground ambulance services. This also applies when you are out on Medical Travel but choose to stay for additional personal days. We also do not cover the cost of any related services, such as:

- hospital transfers;
- escorts; and
- return transportation charges.

Any time you leave the Yukon, we recommend that you get private medical insurance that covers medical travel.

# Dental Care

## Yukon Dental Program

The Yukon Dental Program is a publicly funded dental plan for Yukoners who do not have dental insurance.

To be eligible:

- you must be enrolled in the Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan;
- your gross income must be \$60,000 or less for individuals and \$90,000 or less for individuals with two children. The threshold increases progressively with family size; and
- you must not be eligible for dental coverage under any other program, plan or insurance group.

## What does the program cover?

It covers dental services such as:

- cleanings;
- dental exams;
- fillings;
- X-rays;
- getting teeth pulled; and
- in some cases dentures.

## What benefits can I receive?

- If you're eligible for the Pharmacare and Extended Health Care Benefits program, you could receive up to \$600 each year. Use up your Yukon Dental Program benefits first.
- If you have no other dental coverage or benefits, you could receive \$1,300 each year.
- If you're enrolled in the Yukon Dental Program, and depending on the dental work being done, you should not pay anything at the dentist unless you're over your annual limit.

**Canadian Dental Care Plan (CDCP)**

The Canadian Dental Care Plan (CDCP) is helping make the cost of dental care more affordable for eligible Canadian residents.

Applications now open for:

- Seniors aged 65 and over
- Children under the age of 18
- Adults with a valid federal Disability Tax Credit certificate for 2023

To qualify for CDCP, you must meet all 4 of these requirements:

- You don't have access to dental insurance
- Your adjusted family net income is less the \$90,000
- You are a Canadian resident for tax purposes
- You filed your tax return for the previous year.

If you have dental coverage through a provincial, territorial or federal government social program, you can still qualify for the CDCP. If you qualify, your coverage will be coordinated between the plans to make sure there are no duplication or gaps in coverage.

**Social Worker for Seniors’**

The Adult Protection Unit is mandated through the Adult Protection and Decision-Making Act to make inquiries into reports of suspected physical, emotional, or financial abuse, neglect or self-neglect of adults ages 19 and older, who may be unable to seek support and assistance. Reports are confidential and the identity of the reporter will not be disclosed.

If an adult is experiencing abuse, neglect or self-neglect and if they are unable to seek their own support and assistance, an Adult Protection social worker will use a variety of informal and/or formal support and legal tools to help increase the adult’s safety. They will use the least intrusive and most effective support, while respecting the adult’s values and wishes to the greatest extent possible.

## **Palliative Care Program**

Palliative care is a specialized approach to care for people and families living with a life-limiting illness. Often their illness is at an advanced stage. The goal of a palliative approach to care is to provide comfort and dignity. This approach aims to improve quality of life for both this person and their family.

Palliative care addresses:

- physical issues
- psychological issues
- social issues
- spiritual issues
- practical issues
- an individual's and family's expectations
- an individual's and family's needs, hopes and fears

People with life-limiting illnesses benefit from a palliative approach to care. So do their families. A palliative approach to care can begin early. It may start from the time someone receives a palliative diagnosis all the way through end-of-life care. Palliative care helps those living with life-limiting diseases such as:

- cancer
- advanced heart disease
- respiratory disease
- kidney disease
- Alzheimer's disease
- AIDS
- ALS
- Multiple Sclerosis.

Palliative care is offered in a variety of places, such as:

- at home;
- in hospitals.
- in long-term care homes
- at Wind River Hospice House in Whitehorse.

People living with a palliative diagnosis are often cared for at home by their family and friends. Often, they're also supported by health services in the community. At certain times, it may not be possible to manage care at home for a variety of reasons.

In these situations, palliative care is usually provided by health care professionals. This can happen in the hospital, in long-term care homes or at Wind River Hospice House. This includes short or longer stays in one of these settings. The length of stay often depends on the person and their family’s goals of care.

## Whitehorse Handy Bus Service

Whitehorse Handy Bus provides specialized bus transportation services to persons with mobility difficulties. The bus provides transportation from accessible door to accessible door and is available on a regular basis, if required.

### Who can use the system?

If you are a Whitehorse resident or a visitor to the City, who has a temporary or permanent physical disability that prevents or severely inhibits you from walking 175 meters (574 feet), you are eligible for the Handy Bus service.

If you are booking service for the first time, you will be requested to complete a brief application form over the telephone. This will register you with the system.

### How to make a reservation:

Reservations are accepted Monday to Friday between the hours of 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. by calling 668-8394.

Service is provided on a first-come, first-served basis. Passengers are required to reserve all trips at least 24 hours in advance of the time

requested for travel. The maximum advanced booking is 14 days.  
For inflexible appointments, it is suggested reservations be made as far in advance as possible to ensure you get the time you require.

**General Information:**

The Whitehorse Handy Bus will accommodate any person visiting the city, subject to availability.

Lifts on the Handy Bus vehicles are capable of accommodating motorized scooters. If you are using a scooter and require assistance transferring to an ambulatory seat, you must have an attendant accompany you on the trip.

**Passenger tips**

- Know the destination you are traveling to before you call the office.
- Please be specific with pick up and drop off locations (ie side door).
- Be ready at the nearest accessible door 10 minutes before your scheduled pick-up time.
- Smoking is prohibited on all transit vehicles.
- If an attendant or anyone else will be accompanying you, please advise the office when you make your reservation.
- Please notify the office of any change in address or telephone number.
- Please limit parcels to a manageable amount for you and your attendant.

**When we arrive**

- Handy Bus operators will assist you to and from the vehicle and through the closest accessible door.
- Handy Bus operators are not required to wait more than 5 minutes past your appointment pick-up time.

## Licence Renewal and Medical Requirements

### Keeping Senior Drivers Safely On The Road

A message from Motor Vehicles: Our goal is to keep you driving safe while ensuring the safety of the traveling public

## Renewal of Driver’s Licence (Class 5)

- All driver’s licences are renewed for a five year term;
- A driver’s medical report is required at age 70, 75 and 80 and every two years after.
- The expiry date of the license does not correspond with the due date of your medical report, a reminder letter is sent out. It is your legal responsibility to notify us of changes to your mailing address.

## Renewal of Drivers’ Licences (Commercial Class 1 - 4)

- All licenses are renewed for a five year term;
- Drivers aged 45 to 65 are required to provide a driver’s medical report every three years;
- Drivers aged 65 and over are required to provide a driver’s medical report yearly.

- Vision Requirements: Gradual changes in vision as we age may lead to problems. Good vision is one of the most important requirements of driving. Please visit your optometrist regularly to ensure your vision meets driving standards.

- When you make the appointment be sure that the lawyer is aware you are on a referral from the Law Society and when you attend a meeting at the lawyer's office, take the certificate provided to you and present it to the lawyer at the beginning of the consultation.
- The lawyer will provide you with some basic legal information and advise you whether or not you need a lawyer for your problem.
- The lawyer is not responsible under the Referral Certificate for doing any legal work or taking any further action on your behalf beyond the one half hour initial consultation.
- If you would like that lawyer to represent you after the initial consultation and the lawyer agrees to represent you, the fee and retainer arrangements and instructions will be a private matter between you and the lawyer.

The cost for this consultation is \$30.00 (including GST) and is payable to the lawyer at the consultation.

## Public Guardian and Trustee (PGT)

Protects the legal rights and financial interests of children, acts as guardian of last resort for adults who have no known relatives or friends to assist them, and administers the estates of deceased and missing persons where there is no known next-of-kin. Services include adult guardianship, estate administration, and services for children who have no other trustee named. May also intervene in a private guardianship application if necessary and investigate financial abuse and protect assets of adults.

Fees are charged by the PGT to administer an estate and to provide guardianship services.

# Care Consent Act

## Planning for your Future

At any time in your life you could become very sick, or get in a car accident. Who would you want to make decisions for you if you couldn't? What kind of health care treatment would you want? It is important to plan ahead so that your wishes are respected by your family members and friends. Here are some legal tools that you can use.

## Will (under the Yukon Wills Act)

A Will sets out who you want your money, property and belongings to go to once you die. The executor(s) you name to carry out your wishes has no authority to make decisions for you while you are still alive. It is strongly recommended that a lawyer prepare your Will so that it is legal in the Yukon.

## Enduring Power of Attorney (under the Yukon Enduring Power of Attorney Act)

An Enduring Power of Attorney (EPA) sets out who you want to make financial decisions for you in the event you become incapable of making your own decisions. The EPA can take effect immediately (while you are still capable), or later when you become incapable of managing your finances. You must go to a lawyer to prepare an EPA. This is to protect people from being coerced into signing an EPA. The lawyer who prepares your Will can also prepare an EPA. Ask about discounts if you get the two prepared at the same time.

## Advance Directive (under the Yukon Care Consent Act)

You can prepare an Advance Directive that says who you want to make health care and personal care decisions for you in the event you become incapable of making your own decisions. The person(s) you appoint to be your substitute decision-maker is called a "proxy". The Directive only comes into effect when a health care provider decides that you are not capable of making your own care decision.

You can also set out your wishes for future health care and

personal care in a Directive. This could include whether you want to be resuscitated in the event you are terminally ill with no chance of recovery. It could also include whether or not you want visits from your spiritual advisor/priest/minister if you can no longer communicate. These wishes will only be followed by your proxy when you can no longer make your own decision at the time.

You do not have to go to a lawyer to prepare an Advance Directive. Forms and booklets have been prepared by Yukon Health and Social Services.

**Adult Protection Act**

In 2005, social workers were granted special authority to help support and protect seniors who may be subject to physical, emotional or financial abuse or neglect and are unable to seek help on their own. The senior is always presumed to be capable unless demonstrated otherwise. The social workers can tailor their approach and work with the adult and their support people so that it takes into account the adult’s culture and beliefs. Most of this work is done out of the office in a place the adult chooses. In very serious cases the social workers can apply to the court to obtain a court order to keep the older person safe. If you know of a senior who may be at risk of abuse, please do not hesitate to contact the office. Your identity is protected by our new legislation and information you provide is kept confidential.

# HOUSING

## Yukon Housing Corporation

### Rent Geared to Income Program

The Rent-Geared-to-Income program assists Yukoners in need of affordable, suitable and accessible housing. Rent is calculated at 25 per cent of your total gross monthly household (combined) income.

This application is for individuals, families or seniors applying to live in Yukon Housing Corporation housing.

### Eligibility

- You must be a Yukon resident and have lived in the territory for 12 continuous months before applying. If you previously lived in the Yukon and have recently moved back, you may receive credit for previous residency.
- You must be in good standing with the Yukon Housing Corporation
- You must be a low-income individual, family or senior citizen who cannot obtain affordable and suitable housing on the private market.
- Your household income must be under current housing income limits thresholds.
- You must have less than \$100,000 in assets.

The Home Repair Program provides funding for low to moderate-income Yukon homeowners to repair or address core housing needs in their principal residence.

- a grant for emergency repair for your home;
- a grant to improve the accessibility of your home;
- a grant to improve air quality due to wildfire smoke; and
- a loan to repair your home.

- You must be a Yukon resident for at least 90 days prior to application.
- You own your home and it's your principal residence. This could include home ownership on First Nations land.
- Your household income is below the affordable housing income limits (AHILs).
- Your home needs repairs or upgrades to improve air quality, energy efficiency, overcrowding, accessibility or health and safety.

Applications for all streams are open all year round or until the funding is fully subscribed.

# Long-term Care Homes

There are 4 long-term care homes in Yukon. Copper Ridge Place, Thomson Centre and Whistle Bend Place are located in Whitehorse. McDonald Lodge provides care services in Dawson City.

Referrals for admission to long-term care can be accepted from any source. This can include:

- the applicant themselves.
- an applicant’s family or caregiver; or
- an applicant’s healthcare provider.

Referrals are screened for eligibility. Applicants are assessed before they’re admitted into a long-term care home. To be eligible, applicants must:

- have a valid Yukon health care insurance card.
- have an assessed need to live in long-term care.
- be legally allowed to live in in Canada; and
- have resided in Yukon for:
  - ◆ 12 consecutive months; or
  - ◆ 10 consecutive years in their lifetime; and
  - ◆ not resided outside of Yukon for more than 10 consecutive years.

**Cost**

The Financial Administration act determines room and board in long-term care facilities. Room and board costs \$1,217 per month, or \$40 per day for eligible residents. Day charges will only be used if a resident stay is shorter than 1 month.

The cost for non-eligible residents is \$509 per day. This day charge applies until the resident has lived in Yukon for 12 consecutive months.

**Respite care**

Respite care is available to those who:

- Require temporary care following discharge from the hospital.
- Are caregivers providing care to individuals at home in the community.

***\*\*\*Please note that respite care needs to be booked well in advance (2 – 3 months minimum) and a 2 Step TB test is required\*\*\****

**Community Day Program**

The Community Day Program aims to maintain or increase the level of independence in seniors and Elders. This helps prevent or delay the need to move into a facility. Our services work with those offered by other providers.

The program is for people who have mild to moderate cognitive decline such as dementia. You must:

- Need physical, social, psychological, emotional or recreational support
- Need caregiver respite
- Be a permanent resident of Yukon, or be in the process of becoming a resident
- Live in Whitehorse or within a reasonable driving distance of Whitehorse

The program includes:

- Therapeutic group programming
- Activities in maintaining independence
- Daily group recreational activities
- Socialization and peer support
- Hairdressing services
- Lunch, snacks and beverages
- Support with daily living such as bathing
- Support to caregivers of seniors and Elders

The program runs from 8:30 am to 4:30 pm from Monday to Friday. These services are not available on statutory holidays.

This program is only available at Whistle Bend Place in Whitehorse and costs \$5 per day.
