



Consumer Price Index, September 2021

Released by Statistics Canada — October 20, 2021

Comparing September 2021 to September 2020, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased 4.9% in Whitehorse (data are not available for Yukon). Whitehorse's year-over-year CPI change for the month of September 2021 was 0.5 percentage points higher than that for Canada (4.4%).

The year-over-year increase in Whitehorse CPI for the month of September 2021 was mainly attributable to price increases in gasoline, purchase and leasing of passenger vehicles, and fuel oil and other fuels. Some of these increases were offset by price decreases in mortgage interest cost, telephone services, and home entertainment equipment, parts and services.

On a monthly basis, the CPI in Whitehorse increased 0.1% in September 2021 compared to August 2021; nationally, the CPI increased 0.2%.
