

Consumer Price Index, April 2022

Released by Statistics Canada — May 18, 2022

Comparing April 2022 to April 2021, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased 5.8% in Whitehorse (data are not available for Yukon). Whitehorse's year-over-year CPI change for the month of April 2022 was 1.0 percentage point lower than that for Canada (6.8%).

The year-over-year increase in Whitehorse CPI for the month of April 2022 was mainly attributable to fuel oil and other fuels, gasoline, and purchase and leasing of passenger vehicles. Some of these increases were offset by price decreases in mortgage interest cost, telephone services, and internet access services.

On a monthly basis, the CPI in Whitehorse increased 0.6% in April 2022 compared to March 2022; nationally, the CPI increased 0.6%.
