

## Investment in Building Construction, February 2022

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The estimated investment (seasonally adjusted) in building construction in Yukon for February 2022 was \$32.3 million, an increase of \$10.0 million, or 44.6%, compared to the figure for February 2021. Compared to the figure for January 2022, the February 2022 investment in building construction in Yukon decreased by \$105,000, or 0.3%.

Nationally, investment in building construction (seasonally adjusted) in February 2022, increased 12.3% compared to the figure for February 2021 and increased 4.0% compared to the figure for January 2022.

On a year-to-date basis (January through February of 2022), the total value of investment in building construction in Yukon was \$64.8 million. This represents an increase of \$21.1 million, or 48.1%, compared to the same time period in 2021 (\$43.7 million); residential investment was up \$18.4 million and non-residential investment was up \$2.7 million.
