



Population Estimates, as of July 1, 2024 (preliminary)

Released by Statistics Canada – September 25, 2024

According to preliminary post-censal¹ estimates released by Statistics Canada today, Yukon's annual population was 46,704 as of July 1, 2024. Compared to the revised estimate of 45,463 as of July 1, 2023, Yukon's annual population increased by 1,241, or 2.7%.

Yukon's annual population growth of 2.7% in 2024 was 0.3 percentage points below the national growth rate (3.0%). Among all provinces and territories, Yukon had the fifth highest annual population growth rate in 2024.

Yukon's annual population increase of 1,241 consisted of:

- an increase of 79 from natural growth (407 births and 328 deaths);
- an increase of 1,266 from international migration (895 immigrants, 54 emigrants, 37 returning emigrants, 1,174 incoming non-permanent residents and 786 outgoing non-permanent residents); and
- a decrease of 104 from interprovincial migration (1,541 in-migrants and 1,645 out-migrants).

¹ Postcensal estimates are based on the 2021 Census counts adjusted for census net undercoverage (CNU) (including adjustment for incompletely enumerated reserves and settlements) and the components of demographic growth that occurred since that census.

Note to readers:

- The population growth, which is used to calculate population estimates, is comprised of natural growth, international migration and interprovincial migration.
- **Natural growth** is the difference between the number of births and deaths.
- **Net international migration** is calculated by adding immigrants, returning emigrants and net non-permanent residents, and then subtracting emigrants and net temporary emigrants.
- **Net interprovincial migration** represents movements from one province or territory to another, involving a change in usual place of residence.
