



Information for people entering Yukon

Yukon, BC, NWT and Nunavut residents traveling to Yukon

- You must provide valid government-issued identification to show that you are a Yukon, BC, NWT or Nunavut resident.
- You are not required to self-isolate unless you have travelled outside of Yukon, BC, NWT and Nunavut in the previous 14 days. Some Yukoners may be exempt from the self-isolation requirement, such as critical workers who left the territory in the course of carrying out their duties.

Other Canadian residents

- You must provide valid government-issued identification to show that you are a Canadian resident.
- If you are a Canadian resident that is not a resident of Yukon, BC, NWT and Nunavut, you are required to self-isolate for 14-days unless you are a critical service.
- Non-residents must self-isolate in Whitehorse, unless you are visiting a family member in which case you must self-isolate at their residence in Yukon.
- Non-residents of Yukon who have not left Canada in the past 14 days and have a home on a mine or work site may self-isolate there. You may only self-isolate with family members. The home must be a single residential unit and must be the only housing unit at the claim or camp. You must bring enough supplies to last the 14 days without replenishment.
- You must not stay at territorial campgrounds if you are self-isolating
- You must disclose where you intend to visit or work following the mandatory 14-day self-isolation; the communities, provinces, territories and other countries you visited in the previous 14 days; and whether you have any symptoms consistent with COVID-19.

Those transiting through Yukon to Alaska or other parts of Canada

- You must transit through Yukon within 24 hours from the time of your entry and follow the designated highway route given to you by enforcement officers.
- You must stop at the information kiosk, just outside of Whitehorse.
- Do not travel off the highway into Whitehorse or into rural communities for non-essential reasons.
- If you must get gas, food or other essential services, only access those services that are found on your designated highway corridor.
- If you must stop for the night, only access accommodations found directly on the highway and self-isolate in your room.
- Do not camp at territorial campgrounds.
- You must practise physical distancing, keeping a distance of at least two metres from others.
- If you develop COVID-19 symptoms (cough, fever, or difficulty breathing) during your transit, call 811.

Critical and essential service providers arriving in Yukon for work

Critical Services

Critical Services as those required to preserve life, health and basic societal functioning and establish exceptions. These are services delivered by specific types of workers. Critical service providers must follow recommendations from the Chief Medical Officer of Health:

- Self-isolate when you are not providing the identified critical service.
- Avoid travel outside Yukon unless required as part of delivering the critical service.
- Self-monitor daily for signs and symptoms of COVID-19
- Follow protocols for infection prevention and control including proper hand hygiene.
- Avoid gatherings as much as possible and practise physical distancing.
- Do not share items like electronics, personal protective equipment, food, cigarettes and vaping devices.
- Report to your superiors and a health care practitioner if you develop symptoms or come into contact with anyone who has COVID-19.

Essential Services

Essential Services are those that maintain the reliable operation of infrastructure essential for the health, safety, and economic well-being of Yukon's population as defined in Annex 2 of the Directions and Guidelines. This includes non-critical health care services, food and medical supply delivery, energy and utility services, communications technology, and transportation. Essential service providers who enter the territory must self-isolate for 14 days if they are not Yukon, BC, NWT or Nunavut residents.

Non-compliance with the *Civil Emergency Measures Act* orders

Anyone who fails to obey the following orders may be subject to a fine or imprisonment:

- Self-isolation for 14 days if you are arriving and are required to self-isolate.
- Don't gather in groups of more than 10 people indoors or 50 outdoors.

What recommendations have been issued?

- The CMOH has advised against non-essential travel in and out of Yukon.
- The CMOH ask that individuals practice physical distancing. Stay 2 metres away from people you don't live with.
- The CMOH has advised to limit travel to rural communities there (all those outside Whitehorse).
- If you are traveling to a community follow any travel advisories issued by First Nations governments, municipalities or communities.
- Wash your hands frequently with soap and water or use hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol.
- Stay home if you are feeling sick.
