Health care

- A respiratory assessment centre is open in Whitehorse to support people with acute respiratory illness who
 need medical assessment. Yukoners will be referred to the centre from 811, a family physician, Yukon
 Communicable Disease Control or a hospital emergency department.
- Yukon hospitals have suspended all non-urgent or routine services. Hospitals will continue to provide urgent emergency care. No visitors are allowed at Yukon hospitals, with few exceptions.

Travel and borders

- If you have travelled outside Yukon in the last 14 days, you must self-isolate for 14 days as soon as you arrive in Yukon. This is mandatory. Learn more at https://yukon.ca/en/information-self-isolation.
- As of April 15, 2020, anyone entering Canada must have an adequate self-isolation plan in place; those with no plan will be directed to a guarantine location for a mandatory 14-day self-isolation period.
- Avoid non-essential travel into and out of Yukon and travel to Yukon's rural communities. Residents of rural
 Yukon communities are advised to limit their visits to Whitehorse if possible, and to work together with
 neighbours to coordinate picking up groceries or supplies.
- The Canada-U.S. border is closed to non-essential travel. Avoid all international travel.
- Anyone entering Yukon will need to check in with an Enforcement or CBSA Officer and provide their destination, contact information, and declaration.
- People in Atlin, Lower Post, Fraser, Jade City, Fireside or Pleasant Camp are exempt from the 14-day selfisolation period, provided they have not traveled outside of Yukon or their home community in the past 14 days.
- Workers entering Yukon, including miners, must self-isolate for 14 days. https://yukon.ca/en/health-and-wellness/covid-19/guidelines-work-camps-during-covid-19
