#### Agreements for Support Services for Families\*

Agreements for Support Services for Families, under s. 11 of the *Child and Family Services Agreement* (*CFSA*), provides a broad range of services to a parent who has custody of a child to overcome their child protection concerns. Services provided through these agreements include child care, respite, counselling, financial supports, and parenting programs. These agreements are facilitated by the Family Services Units in Whitehorse and in rural communities.

Instead, the families are not required to sign an agreement that could limit the scope of supports provided, instead this is incorporated into the case planning process on Child Protection and Family Enhancement files. Due to this, the number of ASSFs is lower than the estimated amount, however, there is still significant investment in supporting families.

\*\*\*\*\* There was no consistent way to track the number of child protection reports requiring reponses with the old case management system. While this capacity has been significantly improved with the new system, not all referrals to intake would be included in the 2021-2022 numbers. For example, if a referral was received for a family that was already involved with FCS for a protection service, then the referral would likely be captured as a case note.
