



We have placed an emphasis on sustainable spending that looks at how the government can best allocate its funds while still meeting our obligations and working towards commitments made to Yukoners.


Spending 2019-20 to 2023-24



The Yukon's economy


The Yukon is experiencing Gross Domestic Product (GDP) growth and a strong labour market. We continue to have the lowest unemployment rate in Canada.
