The following areas are closed:

- Carcross pedestrian bridge
- Riverside boardwalks and River Drive in Carmacks
- Marsh Lake Recreation Site (Army Beach) including the parking lot, pedestrian bridge and tenting sites
- Conrad Historic Site
- Parts of the Marsh Lake campground, including sites 10 to 15
- Tagish Campground
- Jackfish Bay Road is open to local traffic only

Extended hours at Waste Management Facilities:

Waste Management Facilities are now open 7 days per week in the Southern Lakes and Lake Laberge. The operating hours for specific facilities are:

- Marsh Lake: 7 days per week from 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.
- Carcross: 7 days per week from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- Tagish: 7 days per week from 12:00 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- Deep Creek: 7 days per week from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m.



Safety messages:

- The Yukon government is recommending local traffic only in all flood impacted areas to ensure public and responder safety and minimize any interference with flood mitigation efforts.
- No boat wakes within 200 metres of the shore as they undermine flood mitigation efforts.
- Stay clear of fast-flowing rivers and potentially unstable riverbanks.
- Be aware of river dangers, including elevated water levels, dangerous currents and increased debris.
- Talk to children about the risks posed by fast flowing rivers and high water levels.
- Do not swim or wade in areas with dangerous currents and uncertainties, such as areas along the Yukon River in Whitehorse, the bridge in Carcross and beach on Bennett Lake.

Volunteer opportunities:

Yukoners looking to volunteer their time to support the government's flood response can go to any of the sandbagging stations in Southern Lakes and Lake Laberge areas. Here's what you need to know:

- Sandbagging stations are accessible 24 hours per day, 7 days per week.
- You do not need to register or check-in when you arrive. Go when you can, for as long as you can.
- Bring a shovel and supplies to be self-sufficient on-site. Remember to bring water!
- Teams of two work best – one person to hold the bag open, the other to shovel sand into the bag.
- Only fill the sandbags 60 percent full to facilitate placement.
- Respect COVID-19 rules and maintain physical distancing.

There are active flood responses underway across Yukon:

Southern Lakes and Lake Laberge

An Incident management team (IMT) is on-site and is maintaining a response to the affected areas:

- There are evacuation alerts in effect for [areas of Lake Laberge, Tagish, Marsh Lake and the Lewes River Road](#).
- There is an evacuation order in effect for [a property on Shallow Bay Road at Lake Laberge](#).
- Water levels on Bennett Lake, Tagish Lake, and Marsh Lake are currently 10.5, 5, and 15 centimetres above 2007 levels, respectively.
- Lake Laberge dropped just under 2 centimetres, and is now 40.5 centimetres above 2007 levels.
- An IMT from Alberta is due to arrive in Yukon Tuesday for a 2-week period, taking over from the current Saskatchewan-based IMT.
- An extension to Yukon's request for federal assistance has been approved and Canadian Armed Forces personnel will remain in the territory to assist with flood response.
- Volunteer coordination resources will arrive in Yukon this week, and will assist in adding more structure to the local volunteer response.
- Approximately 13,300 sandbags and 250 superbags are currently being filled per day.
- There are approximately 65 properties impacted by the flooding in the Lake Laberge area, including Jackfish Bay, Shallow Bay, and Deep Creek.
- Crews continue to build a superbag berm along Jackfish Bay Road, and are setting up pumps on the road to assist resident access.



- Sump pumps have been deployed to properties on Shallow Bay Road and ATCO is engaged in safety assessments for the area.
- The IMT continues to assess properties in Deep Creek and provide support where needed.
- Approximately 65 properties are being impacted by flooding in Army Beach. Superbags have been used to reinforce an existing sandbag berm and crews are working to reinforce flood protections in the area. Ground water assessments continue and additional sump pumps are being deployed.
- Superbags are being deployed to high priority properties in South M'Clintock and pumps are being installed in impacted areas. Approximately 45 properties are being impacted by flooding in this area.
- Properties along Lewes River Road (Sawmill Road) are being assessed and monitored by the IMT. RCMP have conducted wellness checks on property owners who are located after the section of road impacted by water.
- In Carcross, mitigation efforts are being led by the Carcross/Tagish First Nation. The IMT will continue to assess the area based on community resources and high water levels.
- Sandbagging is ongoing at priority properties in Tagish and crews continue to work on the superbag berm along the highway.
- Flood information sheets are now posted on bulletin boards at all sandbag stations, including a sign-up sheet for residents who require volunteer assistance. To find the location of sandbag stations, check out the Southern Lakes flood information map here: yukon.ca/emergencies

Carmacks

An Incident management team (IMT) is on-site and is maintaining a response to the affected areas:

- The water level is down about 31 inches from the high water mark, and continues to drop approximately 2 inches per day.
- Some superbags have now been removed from along River Drive and are being stored for future use or redeployment.
- A boil water advisory remains in place and two homes are under boil order.

Other areas being monitored:

Whitehorse

The City of Whitehorse has activated its Emergency Operations Centre (EOC), located at 305 Range Road in the Public Safety Building:

- City of Whitehorse crews are continuing to sandbag priority areas of the community.
- Mobilization of a superbag berm began in the Marwell subdivision to strengthen priority areas. In addition, superbags are being used to weigh down the Bert Law Bridge along the Millennium Trail. The bridge has been closed since July 2nd due to high water levels.
- Members of the public are asked to keep their distance from the edge of the Yukon River at all times, as some areas may be unstable and dangerous.
