## Census '96

### Aboriginal Data

The following statistics are from the 1996 Census of Canada which occurred on May 14, 1996.

#### Introduction

The following 1996 Census data cannot be compared to data from the 1991 Census and previous censuses. Prior to 1996, census data on Aboriginal persons were derived from a question that asked about their ethnic origin or ancestry. The 1996 Census included a new question that asked more directly if the person is an Aboriginal person, that is, North American Indian, Metis or Inuit. The information obtained from this question was used to compile the data provided in this report.

#### 1 — Highlights

- In Yukon, the total Aboriginal population in 1996 was 6,175 individuals or 20.1% of the total population. The Aboriginal population that are members of a Band/First Nation was 5,250 or 17.1% of the total population. In Canada, the total Aboriginal population was 2.8% of the total population.
- Of the larger Yukon communities (greater than 450), Carmacks had the highest percentage of Aboriginal people (63.4%) in 1996. Whitehorse had an Aboriginal population of 2,775 or 13.2%.
- Of the total Aboriginal population in the Yukon in 1996, 4,970 or 80.5% were Registered Indians.

#### **Definitions**

**Aboriginal Population**: Refers to those people who reported identifying with at least one Aboriginal group, that is, North American Indian, Metis or Inuit. Also included are all those who reported being a Treaty Indian or a Registered Indian as defined by the Indian Act of Canada, as well as members of an Indian Band or First Nation.

**Registered Indian**: Those people who reported that they were registered under the Indian Act of Canada. **North American Indian Population**: Those people who reported that they were North American Indian, either in a single or multiple response, in the Aboriginal identity question, as well as persons who did not report an Aboriginal group but who were Registered Indians or members of an Indian Band or First Nation.

**Metis Population**: Those people who reported that they were Metis, either in a single or multiple response, in the Aboriginal identity question.

**Inuit Population**: Those people who reported that they were Inuit, either in a single or multiple response, in the Aboriginal identity question.

**Single Response**: Those people who entered a single response (North American Indian, Metis or Inuit) to the Aboriginal self-reporting question.

**Multiple Response**: Those people who reported any combination of two or more of the following responses to the Aboriginal self-reporting question; North American Indian, Metis or Inuit.

#### 3 – Aboriginal Population, Yukon Communities, 1996 Census

Of the larger Yukon communities (greater than 450), Carmacks had the highest percentage of Aboriginal people, at 63.4%, followed by Haines Junction with 40.0% and Dawson with 27.0%. Of the smaller Yukon communities (less than 450), Two Mile Village, Two and One Half Mile Village and Upper Liard all had populations that were 100% Aboriginal.


