



## Population and Dwelling counts, Census 2021


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In Yukon, the 2021 Census of Population enumerated 40,232 individuals on May 11, 2021. The 2021 Census enumerated 36,991,981 people across Canada.

## **Population Growth Rate**

Yukon's population grew 12.1% in 2021 compared to the 2016 Census. This rate was above the national average (5.2%).

Yukon's population growth rate of 12.1% was the highest in the country, followed by Prince Edward Island (8.0%), British Columbia (7.6%), and Ontario (5.8%).
