Consumer Price Index, 2023

Released by Statistics Canada – January 16, 2024

Comparing 2023 to 2022, on an annual average basis, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased 4.9% in Whitehorse (data are not available for Yukon). Whitehorse's year-over-year CPI change for 2023 was 1.0 percentage point higher than that for Canada (3.9%).
