



Consumer Price Index, December 2022

Released by Statistics Canada – January 17, 2023

Comparing December 2022 to December 2021, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased 8.1% in Whitehorse (data are not available for Yukon). Whitehorse's year-over-year CPI change for the month of December 2022 was 1.8 percentage points higher than that for Canada (6.3%).

The main contributors to the year-over-year increase in Whitehorse CPI for the month of December 2022 were fuel oil and other fuels; traveller accommodation; and mortgage interest cost. Some of these increases were offset by price decreases in internet access services; men's clothing; and spectator entertainment (excluding video and audio subscription services).

On a monthly basis, the CPI in Whitehorse increased by 0.1% in December 2022 compared to November 2022; while nationally, the CPI decreased by 0.6%.

On an annual average basis, the CPI in Whitehorse in 2022 increased by 6.8%; Canada's 2022 annual average CPI also increased by 6.8%.
