



Consumer Price Index, July 2022

Released by Statistics Canada – August 16, 2022

Comparing July 2022 to July 2021, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased 7.7% in Whitehorse (data are not available for Yukon). Whitehorse's year-over-year CPI change for the month of July 2022 was 0.1 percentage point higher than that for Canada (7.6%).

The main contributors to the year-over-year increase in Whitehorse CPI for the month of July 2022 were traveller accommodation, fuel oil and other fuels, and gasoline. Some of these increases were offset by price decreases in telephone services, internet access services, and property taxes and other special charges.

On a monthly basis, the CPI in Whitehorse increased 0.9% in July 2022 compared to June 2022; nationally, the CPI increased 0.1%.
