

Consumer Price Index, September 2022

Released by Statistics Canada – October 19, 2022

Comparing September 2022 to September 2021, the Consumer Price Index (CPI) increased 7.5% in Whitehorse (data are not available for Yukon). Whitehorse's year-over-year CPI change for the month of September 2022 was 0.6 percentage points higher than that for Canada (6.9%).

The main contributors to the year-over-year increase in Whitehorse CPI for the month of September 2022 were fuel oil and other fuels, gasoline, and traveller accommodation. Some of these increases were offset by price decreases in internet access services and telephone services.

On a monthly basis, the CPI in Whitehorse remained the same in September 2022 compared to August 2022; nationally, the CPI increased 0.1%.
