



Employment Insurance, March 2024 (preliminary)

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In March 2024, the preliminary number of EI beneficiaries (seasonally adjusted) receiving regular income support benefits¹ in Yukon was 610; of which, 400 were males and 210 were females. Compared to March 2023, the total number of beneficiaries increased by 120, or 24.5%; compared to the February 2024 preliminary figure, the total number of beneficiaries increased by 30, or 5.2%.

Nationally, the preliminary number of EI beneficiaries (seasonally adjusted) in March 2024 increased by 18.9% compared to March 2023 and increased by 0.1% from the February 2024 preliminary figure.

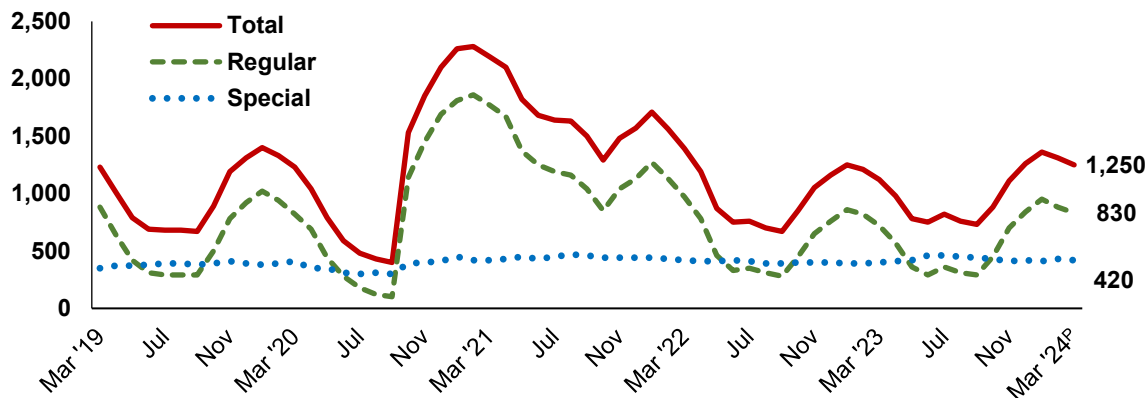
