## Census ‘96

## Ethnic Origin and Visible Minorities

The following statistics are from the 1996 Census of Canada which occurred on May 14, 1996.

## 1 - Highlights

## In 1996 in Canada:

- 5.3 million persons, accounting for $19 \%$ of the total population, reported their only ethnic origin as "Canadian". An additional 3.5 million persons (12\%) reported both Canadian and other origins. In the Yukon, 4,595 persons, accounting for $15 \%$ of the total Yukon population, reported their only ethnic origin as "Canadian". An additional 4,405 people (14\%) reported both Canadian and other origins.
- 4.9 million people, or $17 \%$ of the population, reported British Islesonly ancestry, and about 2.7 million, or $9 \%$, reported Frenchonly ancestry. In the Yukon, 5,230 people, or $17 \%$ of the population, reported British Isles-only ancestry, and 700, or $2 \%$, reported French-only ancestry.
478 thousand persons, accounting for $1.7 \%$ of the total population, reported their only ethnic origin as "Aboriginal". In the Yukon, 3,615 persons, or $11.8 \%$ of the population, reported "Aboriginal" as their only ethnic origin.
- 3.2 million persons ( $11.2 \%$ of the total population) identified themselves as members of a visible minority. In the Yukon, 1,000 persons ( $3.3 \%$ of the total population) identified themselves as members of a visible minority.


## Note to Readers:

For the 1996 census, the format of the ethnic origin question was modified significantly from the 1991 census. The actual question was the same; however in 1991, 15 of the most frequent origins were listed on the questionnaire and respondents were asked to mark as many as were applicable ("Canadian" was not one of the choices). Two blank spaces were also provided. In 1996, the questionnaire did not provide pre-listed answer categories (origins). Instead, four blank spaces were provided, and 24 examples were given. For the first time, "Canadian" was included among the examples because it was the fifth most frequently reported origin in 1991. As expected, these modifications, particularly the inclusion of "Canadian" as an example, resulted in a major change in the way ethnic origins were reported. As a result, the $\mathbf{1 9 9 6}$ Census data on ethnic origin cannot be compared meaningfully with data from earlier censuses.

## -4-Visible Minority Population, Yukon

In Canada in 1996, 3.2 million people identified themselves as members of a visible minority. This represents $11.2 \%$ of the total population. Three out of every ten individuals who identified themselves as visible minorities were born in Canada (28.6\%), and the rest were immigrants. In the Yukon in 1996, 1,000 people identified themselves as members of a visible minority. This represents $3.3 \%$ of the total population. Four out of every ten individuals who identified themselves as visible minorities were born in Canada ( $41.0 \%$ ), and the rest were immigrants.

## Definitions

Ethnic Origin: Refers to the ethnic or cultural group(s) to which the respondent's ancestors belong. An ancestor is someone from whom a person is descended, and is usually more distant than a grandparent. Ethnic origin pertains to the ancestral roots or background of the population and should not be confused with place of birth, citizenship or nationality. Visible Minority: Persons, other than Aboriginal peoples, who are non-Caucasian in race or non-white in colour, as defined by the Employment Equity Act (includes Chinese, South Asians, Blacks, Arabs and West Asians, Filipinos, Southeast Asians, Latin Americans, Japanese, Koreans and Pacific Islanders).
Single Response: Occurs when a respondent provides one ethnic origin only.
Multiple Response: Occurs when a respondent provides two or more ethnic origins.
Total Responses: Are the sum of single and multiple responses, and indicate the number of persons who reported a specified ethnic origin, either as their only origin or in addition to one or more other ethnic groups.
