


 Over the last three Censuses, the population, labour force, and employed decreased in 2001 compared to 1996 and then increased in 2006 to higher than the 1996 levels. Participation rates have steadily decreased while those not in the labour force have steadily increased. The unemployment rate rose in 2001 compared to 1996 but decreased in 2006 compared to 2001. In the 2006 Census, the Yukon saw a decrease of 2.2 percentage points in the unemployment rate, along with a 1.7 percentage point drop in the participation rate compared to the 2001 Census. In the 2006 Census, the Yukon labour force increased by 6.5%, to 19,120 from 17,945 in 2001 Census, while those not in the labour force increased by 18.3%, to 5,365 from 4,535.

- According to the 2006 Census, there were 17,315 employed Yukoners out of a total labour force of 19,120. Of those employed, 50.5% were male and 49.5% were female.
- Of the total labour force (19,120), there were 1,805 unemployed Yukon-





er in 2006, consisting of 1,075 males (59.6%) and 730 females (40.4%).


• The unemployment rate for the Yukon in 2006 was 9.4%. Males had a higher unemployment rate than females at 11.0% and 7.8% respectively.


Labour Force by Gender

 The total Yukon population 15 years of age and over was 24,490. Of that population, 21.9% (5,365) were not in the labour force. Females accounted for 54.1% (2,900) and males accounted for 45.9% (2,465).











Canadian Employment Rates, 2006



- According to 2006 Census, of the 24,490 population 15 years of age and over, Yukon had 17,315 individuals employed, 1,805 unemployed and 5,365 not in the work force.
- In the 2006 Census, Yukon's employment rate was 70.7%, and second highest to Alberta's employment rate of 70.9% and 8.3 percentage points above Canada's employment rate of 62.4%.
- Yukon's unemployment rate (9.4%) was 2.8 percentage points above Canada's unemployment rate of 6.6%. Yukon had the sixth highest unemployment rate in Canada.

Selected Yukon Communities, 2006

• In Yukon, Whitehorse employed the most individuals (11,920), with the community of Dawson second, employing 810 individuals and Watson Lake third, employing 480 individuals.



- Overall, Yukon had a 78.1% participation rate. The community of Dawson recorded the highest participation rate of 83.5% while Mayo was second with 81.6%. The community of Watson Lake had the third highest participation rate of 80.6%. Tagish had the lowest participation rate of 56.4%
- The community of Pelly Crossing had the highest unemployment rate of 21.6%, followed by Ross River, which had an unemployment rate of 21.2%.

 In 2006, Public Administration employed the most Yukoners (4,145), followed by Retail Trade (1,735), Health Care and Social Assistance (1,650) and Accommodations and Food Services (1,480). These top four 2006 industries were the same as in 2001.

 Of the total population 15 years of age and over (17,315), 86.7% (15,020) were employed in the service-producing sector while the remaining 13.2% (2,290) were employed in the goods-producing sector.

· The median age of those employed in the goods-producing sector was 42.9 years while those in the service-producing sector was 43.6 years. The highest median age of 48.1 years was in the Mining, Oil & Gas Extraction industry. Educational Services recorded the second highest median age of 47.7 years. The lowest median age was 35.4 years in the Retail Trade industry followed by Accomodation & Food Services at 35.9 years.
