

- While the percentage of the population who speak a non-official language most often at home has increased since 2001, so has the percentage of the population who reported having knowledge of both official languages.



Note: Mother tongue refers to the first language learned at home in childhood and still understood by the individual.

 In 2006 the majority of Yukoners reported English as their sole mother tongue (85%), while 4% reported French and 9% had a non-official language as a mother tongue. Just under one percent of Yukoners indicated having more than one mother tongue.

- In 2006, German was the most predominant non-official language mother tongue in the Yukon, with 25% of allophones (persons whose mother tongue is neither English nor French) listing it as their single mother tongue, followed by Athapaskan languages (20%) and Chinese languages (8%).
- After taking a dip in 2001, the 2006 number of Yukoners who listed French as their sole mother tongue were essentially back to where they were in 1996.
- There has been a steady increase in the number of Yukoners reporting a Malayan-Polynesian language as a mother tongue; the majority of those people learned Tagalog as a child.
- There was also a strong increase in the numbers of Yukoners who reported a Sino-Tibetan language (Chinese languages) as a mother tongue; 2006 saw an increase of 44% in this category over 2001.
- The number of Yukoners listing an Aboriginal language as a sole mother tongue increased by 16% in 2006, notably in the Algonquian languages, Athapaskan languages, and Inuktitut.
- Conversely, there were 42% fewer Yukoners in 2006 who reported an Indo-Iranian language as a mother tongue.
- The grouping for those with English and a non-official language as a mother tongue increased steadily between 1996 and 2006.



Knowledge of Official Languages, Yukon 2006

• 26,515 of Yukon's 30,190 residents reported knowing • Less than half of a percent of Yukoners knew only only English as one of Canada's official languages, making up 88% of the population.

French, a similar amount knew neither English nor French, and 11% knew English and French.

• Eighty-four percent of Yukoners reported knowledge only of English and/or French.

• Of the rest, 4,195 or 14% reported knowledge of one non-official language.

• Just under two percent knew two non-official languages, and there were 15 Yukoners reported as knowing three or more non-official languages.

• The age categories for 65 and over had the highest percentage of people knowing at least one non-official language.

 The census showed that in 2006, 95% of Yukoners spoke English at home. Other languages are not spoken at home as often as they are reported as mother tongues. Three percent of Yukoners spoke a non-official language most often at home at the time of the Census, up slightly from 2.5% in 2001. 540 Yukoners spoke French most often at home in 2006, in comparison to 415 Yukoners in 2001, an increase of 30%. However, the percentage of the total population who spoke French most often at home increased by less than half of a percent.



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
