The following statistics are from the 1996 Census of Canada which occurred on May 14, 1996.


1– Highlights

Occupation Groups

- Occupation groups showing a gain in percentage of the employed labour force from 1991 to 1996 were Occupations in social science, education, government service; Occupations in art, culture, recreation and sport and, Sales and service occupations. Occupation groups showing a loss in percentage of the employed labour force were Management occupations; Business, finance and administrative occupations; Trades, transport and equipment operators and related occupations and, Occupations unique to primary industry.
- The occupation with the largest gain in employed labour force was G9 Sales and service occupations, with a gain of 520 people (46.2%) between 1991 and 1996. The occupation with the largest loss in employed labour force was H0 Contractors and supervisors in trades and transportation which declined by 200 people.

Industry Divisions

- Industry divisions showing gains in percentage of the labour force were Logging and forestry; Mining, quarrying and oil wells; Real estate operator and insurance agent; Business service; Educational service; Accommodation, food and beverage service and Other service industries. The largest percentage point gain was in Other Service Industries (up 1.9 percentage points).
- Industry divisions showing losses in percentage of the labour force were Agricultural and related services; Manufacturing; Construction; Transportation and storage; Communication and other utilities; Wholesale trade; Retail trade; Finance and insurance industries and Government service. The industry group showing the greatest loss in percentage of the labour force was Government service (down 2.4 percentage points).



Occupation Groups, Yukon

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

Notes

Occupation Groups: (based on 1991 Standard Occupational Classification) – Refers to the kind of work persons were doing during the reference week, as determined by their kind of work and the description of the most important duties in their job. Data are available for persons 15 years of age and over, excluding institutional residents. If the person did not have a job during the week prior to enumeration, the data relate to the job of longest duration since January 1, 1995. Persons with two or more jobs were to report the information for the job at which they worked the most hours.

Industry Divisions: (based on 1980 Standard Industrial Classification) - Refers to the general nature of the business carried out in the establishment where the person worked, as indicated by the name of the employer and the kind of business, industry or service. Data are available for persons 15 years of age and over, excluding institutional residents. If the person did not have a job during the week prior to enumeration, data relate to the job of longest duration since January 1, 1995. Persons with two or more jobs were to report the information for the job at which they worked the most hours.



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
