# Yukon Employment and Skills Survey 2023

# **Highlights:**

- In the fall of 2023, based on the population aged 18 to 65 years, Yukon's labour force totalled 25,189 people; 24,188 employed and 1,001 unemployed.
- Private businesses and corporations employed the largest proportion of workers in 2023 (48.5%), while employment across all four levels of government accounted for 42.1% of workers. Employees working for non-profit organizations made up 6.9% of the employed workforce.
- Supervisors in natural resources, agriculture and related production averaged the most hours worked per weeks at 56.1 hours.

In the fall (September to November) of 2023, Yukon Bureau of Statistics (YBS) conducted the Yukon Employment and Skills Survey to collect data from individuals in the age group of 18 to 65 years living in a randomly drawn sample of Yukon households (see note on methodology on page 17). The survey collected data on employment; unemployment; skills, education and training; as well as on selected demographic variables. The purpose of the survey is to produce labour supply data as supplement to the labour demand data produced by the Yukon Labour Demand Survey and the Yukon Business Survey.

All figures in this report are rounded and components may not sum to totals.



In the fall of 2023, based on the population aged 18 to 65 years, Yukon's labour force included 25,189 people, accounting for an 81.4% participation rate; 5,702 people were not in the labour force. Of the labour force, 24,188 were employed and 1,001 were unemployed, resulting in a 78.1% employment rate, and a 4.0% unemployment rate.

# Multiple Job Holders, Yukon, 2023

In the fall of 2023, 77.2% of employed persons working in Yukon, held only one job (18,385 people); 17.1% (4,077 people) held two jobs; and 3.9% held three or more jobs (935 people).

In the fall of 2023, Supervisors in natural resources, agriculture and related production averaged the most hours worked per week (56.1 hours). Harvesting, landscaping and natural resources labourers occupations and Support occupations in art, culture and sport both averaged the lowest hours per week (31.9 hours). Yukon's overall average was 41.7 hours per week.

Workers in **Professional occupations in health** reported the highest average wage rate at \$56.13 per hour. Workers in **Retail sales and service supervisors and specialized occupations in sales and services** reported the lowest average wage rate at \$20.37 per hour. The overall average wage rate in Yukon was \$38.66 per hour.

Occupations in natural resources and related production had the highest average numbers of years in their current jobs at 24.9 years. On average, workers in Yukon had been in their current job for 5.7 years.



Of those people who had both three years or less experience in their current primary position in the fall of 2023, and also were employed in a different occupational category in their previous role:

- 332 people left a position in the Business, finance and administration occupations to a position in the Professional occupations in law, education, social, community and government services;
- 194 people entered the labour force to a position in Sales and services occupations; and
- 135 people left in a position in the Management occupations to a position in the Professional occupations in law, education, social, community and government services.

### **Employment by Sector, Yukon, 2023**



In the fall of 2023, 48.5% of Yukon workers were employed by a private business or corporation<sup>1</sup> in their primary job, 6.9% were employed by non-profit organizations and 1.7% were employed by Other employers. Government<sup>2</sup> employment accounted for 42.1% of the employed labour force (primary job).

Of the total workers employed by government (10,031), the Yukon government employed two-thirds of workers (6,625, or 66.0%); First Nations governments employed 1,493 workers (14.9%); the federal government employed 1,191 workers (11.9%); and municipal governments employed 656 workers (6.5%).

In the fall of 2023, a total of 436 Yukon residents were employed outside Yukon. This accounted for 1.8% of all employed persons in Yukon. The most common reasons for not working in Yukon were: **Employer is outside** Yukon (36.9%); Type of work is not available in Yukon (12.5%); and Student (10.4%).

Overall, 85.3% of respondents felt they did have enough opportunity to use the knowledge and skills they had in their primary job. There were six occupation categories where all respondents reported they did have enough opportunity to use the knowledge and skills they have.

The occupation with the highest proportion of workers who did not feel they had enough opportunity to use the skills and knowledge they had, was Occupations in natural resources and related production (30.8%); Sales and service support occupations (26.8%); and Care providers and public protection support occupations and student monitors, crossing guards and related occupations (24.6%).

Overall, 2,577 people, or 10.8% of those working in Yukon, felt that they did not have enough opportunity in their current primary jobs to use their knowledge or skills.

The most commonly cited knowledge or skills that respondents were not fully using were: Leadership and communication skills (45.7%); Analytical, trouble-shooting, problem-solving skills (36.4%); and Business and administration related skills (27.4%).

Overall, 91.5% of respondents felt they did have adequate skills and training for their current primary job.

There were nine occupation categories where all respondents reported they were adequately skilled and trained for their current jobs.

The occupations with the highest proportion of workers who did not feel they were adequately skilled and trained for their current job were Support occupations in art, culture and sport (30.2%); Technical occupations in art, culture and sport (27.9%); and Occupations in art, culture and sport (24.5%).

Overall, 1,040, or 4.4% of people in Yukon aged 18 to 65, felt they were not adequately skilled and trained for their current primary job.

The most frequent responses given for the skills or training they felt were missing were: Leadership and communication skills (40.3%); Computer and technical skills (28.8%); and Analytical, trouble-shooting, problemsolving skills (27.1%).



Respondents were asked what minimum level of formal education or training would be required to get the type of primary job they currently have. Overall, 9.2% of current primary jobs would not require Formal education, 17.4% would require a High school diploma or certificate or equivalency, 16.4% would require a Bachelor's Degree, 5.2% would require a Master's Degree, and 3.0% would require a Professional degree.

Including those that would not require Formal education, a total of 3,176 jobs, or 13.3%, would require less than a High school diploma or certificate.








# Are you currently a student at a school, college or university\*?



Do you self-identify as Indigenous, that is, First Nations, Métis or Inuit?



#### Note on Methodology

The Yukon Employment and Skills Survey is designed as a stratified random sample survey of Yukon households. The sample of the survey includes one randomly drawn individual belonging to the 18- to 65-year age group in a household from an eligible subset of households in the Dwelling-Based Household Survey Frame using community, age and sex as strata.

For the 2023 survey, the eligible subset of the frame included 16,418 Yukon households with at least one adult member belonging to the 18- to 65-year age group. A total of 3,508 individuals with these characteristics were randomly selected for the survey. The survey was fielded in the fall (September to December) of 2023. After adjusting for non-responses, analytical weights were derived and applied to the responses to generate representative estimates. The response rate for the 2023 survey was 61.4% and the refusal rate was 16.1%.

The Yukon Employment and Skills Survey report presents occupations by major category. The National Occupation Classification (NOC) used to classify occupations in this report changed from NOC 2016 to NOC 2021. This introduced major structural changes to the classification of existing occupational groups and a brand new five-digit codification system to replace the four-digit system of NOC 2016. While this report presents only on the first 2 digits (major group) of NOC 2021, these 2-digit codes are not strictly comparable to those presented in previous Yukon Employment and Skills Survey reports.
