Population Report Second Quarter, 2019

Highlights:

- The estimated population of Yukon on June 30, 2019 was 41,352; an increase of 709, or 1.7%, compared to the revised figure for June 30, 2018 (40,643).
- Comparing June 30, 2019 to June 30, 2009, Yukon's population increased by 7,195, or 21.1%. The population of the Whitehorse area increased by 6,226, or 23.9%; Dawson City increased by 460, or 24.2%; and Watson Lake decreased by 75, or 4.8%.

Notes on methodological changes: Prior to 2012, the Yukon Bureau of Statistics (YBS) produced population estimates twice a year. Effective 2012, the estimates are produced quarterly.


Population estimates prior to June 2010 were based on information in Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan (YHCIP) files and a semi-annual health care update survey that estimated the number of plan members who were no longer Yukon residents. In 2010, the estimation model was revised and the population counts for June 2010 through December 2014 were derived by tracking changes in YHCIP files and other administrative data files. In 2015, the model was further revised to make it more comprehensive and to improve accuracy based on information in all available and applicable administrative data files of the Yukon government. In addition, the total population estimates for April 2011 onwards are being calibrated to post-censal population estimates adjusted for net undercoverage.

The new model assigns residents of unorganized areas to their nearest communities. Estimates for Whitehorse now include population in surrounding areas as well as in Marsh Lake to remain comparable with the geographical area defined by Statistics Canada as the Whitehorse Census Agglomeration.

All monthly estimates are as of the last day of the month. The June estimates represent annual figures.

Due to the change in methodology in 2015, figures presented in this publication for the period from April 2011 onwards are not strictly comparable to figures prior to the period.

Monthly Population, June 30, 1999 to June 30, 2019



- Yukon's population declined almost steadily from 1999 to 2001, and then fluctuated around 30,000 from 2001 to 2003.
- From 2004 through 2014, the population increased almost steadily in most quarters of every year except in 2013. From 2015 onwards, the upward trend in population growth gained momentum with very high growth rates recorded in many quarters, most of them being in 2016 and 2017. The June 30, 2019 population at 41,352 is the new record-high for Yukon.
- On June 30, 2019, Yukon's population (41,352), increased by 390 people, or 1.0%, from March 31, 2019, and increased by 709 people, or 1.7%, from June 30, 2018 (revised 40,643).

¹Accurate population counts during the Gold Rush are not available. However, the first Census population figure for Yukon was 27,219 in 1901.



- During the second quarter of 2019, Yukon's population increased by 390 people from 40,962 on March 31, 2019 to 41,352 on June 30, 2019.
- Comparing the months of April through June of 2019 to their respective 2018 months, population increased: 2.1% in April; 2.0% in May; and 1.7% in June.

Comparing June 30, 2019 to June 30, 2009, growth occurred as follows (15-year age groupings):

- o to 14 years = increased 1,080 people, (18.9%);
- 15 to 29 years = increased 141 people, (2.0%);
- 30 to 44 years = increased 2,428 people, (32.9%);
- 45 to 59 years = decreased 125 people, (-1.4%);
- 6o to 74 years = increased 2,950 people, (76.5%); and
- 75 years and over = increased 721 people, (76.5%).










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
Annual (June 30th) Population and Growth, Yukon, 2009 to 2019

Yukon's annual (June 30th) population increased by 7,195, from 34,157 in 2009 to 41,352 in 2019. This represents a compound annual growth rate of 1.9%. However, this growth has not occurred evenly from year to year. It ranged from a low growth of 0.8% in 2013 to a revised high growth of 3.0% in 2017.



Distribution of Yukon Population by Age Group and Gender, 2009 and 2019

Yukon's population has grown and aged since 2009 – particularly as the baby-boom (current age 54-73) and echoboom populations (current age 27-47) have aged. These combined populations have grown by 35.4%, while the remainder of the population has grown by 5.6%.







Distribution of Annual (June 30th) Population by Broad Age Groups, Yukon, 2009 to 2019




The distribution of broad age groups as a percentage of Yukon's annual (June 30th) population over the period from 2009 to 2019 shows that -

- the proportion of population in the age group of 15-64 years decreased each year (with the exception of 2010) from 75.0% in 2009 to 70.4% in 2019; a decrease of 4.6 percentage points.
- in contrast, the proportion of population in the age group of 65+ years has steadily increased from 8.2% of the total population in 2009 to 13.2% in 2019; an increase of 4.9 percentage points.

Annual (June 30th) Indigenous Population Growth, 2009 to 2019




The Indigenous population (on the basis of self-reported identity) increased by 789, from 7,735 in 2009 to 8,524 in 2018. This represents a compound annual growth rate of 1.0%. The annual growth rate ranged from a low of 0.05% in 2019 to a revised high of 2.7% in 2009.

Note: Revisions to annual Indigenous populations have been made back to 2011 due to additional administrative records becoming available.

Distribution of Indigenous Population by Age Group and Gender, 2019

On June 30, 2019, the Indigenous population (on the basis of self-reported identity) in Yukon was estimated at 8,524. Of this total:

- 17.8% were under 15 years of age; 73.0% were between 15 and 64 years; and 9.3% were 65 years of age or older.
- 49.8% were male; 50.2% were female.





4,760 (55.8%) resided in Whitehorse area, while 3,764 (44.2%) resided in rural communities.

The Indigenous population (8,524) represented 20.6% of Yukon's population (41,352) in 2019. The median age for the Indigenous population was 33 years; for non-Indigenous, it was 41.




Annual (June 30th) Population by Aggregated Whitehorse Subdivisions, 2015 to 2019 (within municipal boundaries)

Comparing 2019 to 2015, all aggregated subdivisions in Whitehorse experienced growth. The aggregated subdivision area of Porter Creek/Crestview⁴ (which includes Whistle Bend) collectively experienced the largest increase in number of residents (1,110 or 23.5%), followed by the Whitehorse West² aggregate area (487 residents; or 6.7%), Riverdale (304 residents; or 5.8%), Downtown/Marwell (255 residents; or 8.4%), Takhini³ aggregate (151 residents; or 5.4%), South Highway¹ aggregate (135 residents; or 7.2% increase) and North Highway⁵ area aggregate (55 residents; or 13.5%) over the same time period.


