# Population Report Second Quarter, 2021

#### **Highlights:**

- The estimated population of Yukon on June 30, 2021 was 43,118; an increase of 920, or 2.2%, compared to the revised figure for June 30, 2020 (42,198).
- Comparing June 30, 2021 to June 30, 2011, Yukon's population increased by 7,659, or 21.6%. The population of the Whitehorse area increased by 6,650, or 24.4%; Dawson City increased by 375, or 19.5%; and Watson Lake increased by 26, or 1.8%.

#### Notes on methodological changes:

Official population counts prior to June 2010 were based on information in Yukon Health Care Insurance Plan (YHCIP) files and a semi-annual health care update survey that estimated the number of plan members who were no longer Yukon residents. In 2010, the estimation model was revised and the population counts for June 2010 through December 2014 were derived by tracking changes in YHCIP files and other administrative data files. In 2015, the model was further revised to make the approach more comprehensive and to improve accuracy based on information in all available and applicable administrative data files of the Yukon government. In addition, the total population count of April 2011 was calibrated to a census-based estimate adjusted for net undercoverage.


In 2020, the model was updated by prioritizing residential addresses over mailing addresses in the assignment of communities. This update allowed for separate reporting of population estimates for Johnson's Crossing and Mendenhall, and changes in the organization of Whitehorse subdivisions. The changes have been applied to all population estimates from June 2019 onwards.

Changes in community and subdivision populations from one time period to another are not only due to natural population change and migrations, but may also be due to the reassignment of residential addresses as additional administrative data became available.

All monthly estimates are as of the last day of the month. The June estimates represent annual figures.

Due to the change in methodology in 2015, figures presented in this publication for the period from April 2011 onwards are not strictly comparable to figures prior to that period.

### Monthly Population, June 30, 2001 to June 30, 2021



- From 2004 through 2014, Yukon's population increased almost steadily in most quarters of every year except in 2013. From 2015 onwards, the upward trend in population growth gained momentum with very high growth rates recorded in many quarters, most of them being in the last five years. The June 30, 2021 population at 43,118 is the new record-high¹ for Yukon.
- On June 30, 2021, Yukon's population (43,118), increased by 117 people, or 0.3%, from the revised figure for March 31, 2021 (43,001), and increased by 920 people, or 2.2%, from June 30, 2020 (42,198, revised).



- During the second quarter of 2021, Yukon's population increased by 117 people from 43,001 (revised) on March 31, 2021 to 43,118 on June 30, 2021.
- Comparing the months of April through June of 2021 to their respective 2020 months, population increased: 2.2% in April; 2.1% in May; and 2.2% in June.

Comparing June 30, 2021 to June 30, 2011, growth occurred as follows (15-year age groupings):

- 0 to 14 years = increased 983 people, (16.5%);
- 15 to 29 years = increased 223 people, (3.0%);
- 30 to 44 years = increased 2,939 people, (38.3%);
- 45 to 59 years = decreased 401 people, (-4.4%);
- 60 to 74 years = increased 3,045 people, (71.3%); and
- 75 years and over = increased 870 people, (85.0%).




#### Annual (June 30th) Population and Growth, Yukon, 2011 to 2021

Yukon's annual (June 30<sup>th</sup>) population increased by 7,659, from 35,459 in 2011 to 43,118 in 2021. This represents a compound annual growth rate of 2.0%. However, this growth has not occurred evenly from year to year. It ranged from a low growth of 0.8% in 2013 to a high growth of 3.0% in 2017.




### Distribution of Yukon Population by Age Group and Gender, 2011 and 2021


The dependency ratio — the ratio of the combined population aged 0-19 years and 65 years and over to the population aged 20-64 years, multiplied by 100 — for Yukon increased from 46.9 in 2011 to 54.2 in 2021, an increase of 7.3 over the 10-year period.






- the proportion of population in the age group of 15-64 years decreased each year from 74.4% in 2011 to 69.8% in 2021; a decrease of 4.6 percentage points.
- in contrast, the proportion of population in the age group of 65+ years has steadily increased from 8.8% of the total population in 2011 to 14.1% in 2021; an increase of 5.3 percentage points.

#### Annual (June 30th) Indigenous Population Growth, 2019 to 2021




The Indigenous population (on the basis of self-reported identity) increased by 32 from 9,514 in 2020 to 9,546 in 2021. This represents a annual growth rate of 0.3%.

## Distribution of Indigenous Population by Age Group and Gender, 2021

On June 30, 2021, the Indigenous population (on the basis of self-reported identity) in Yukon was estimated at 9,546. Of this total:

- 20.6% were under 15 years of age; 69.7% were between 15 and 64 years; and 9.7% were 65 years of age or older.
- 49.9% were male; 50.1% were female.
- 5,582 (58.5%) resided in Whitehorse area, while 3,964 (41.5%) resided in rural communities.



The Indigenous population (9,546) represented 22.1% of Yukon's population (43,118) in 2021. The median age for the Indigenous population was 33.5 years; for non-Indigenous, it was 40.7 years.









Comparing 2021 to 2020 (revised), the population in all aggregated subdivisions of Whitehorse grew, with the exception of North Highway<sup>5</sup> where the population decreased by 3 people (-0.7%). The aggregated subdivision of Porter Creek/Crestview<sup>4</sup> (which includes Whistle Bend) experienced the largest increase in population (496 or 6.7%), followed by Riverdale (168, or 3.3%), Downtown/Marwell (112, or 3.7%), Whitehorse West<sup>2</sup> aggregate (89, or 1.1%), Takhini<sup>3</sup> aggregate (10, or 0.3%) and South Highway<sup>1</sup> aggregate (9, or 0.4%) over the same time period.


