#### Background

The Shakwak Valley has been inhabited for over 10,000 years, and is the homeland of the Southern Tutchone people who had stop-over camps throughout the area during the aboriginal seasonal migration in search of food.

Two Jacquot brothers, Louie and Gene, built a trading post at Burwash Landing in 1904. Most of the native people used the area for a summer stop, but after the Jacquots built some cabins in the area, they moved closer to the post and began a more stationary life-style.

The construction of the Alaska Highway in 1942 led Indian and Inuit Affairs to make Burwash Landing the administrative centre for First Nations in the Kluane area.

In 1990, the band split into two: the White River First Nation, and the Kluane First Nation.

The population of Burwash Landing as of June 1997 was 88. The community is mainly aboriginal. The settlement is administered directly by the Yukon Territorial Government.

#### First Nation Land Acreage and Status

Reserve Land: None.

Land Set Aside: 334.125 Ha. In and around Burwash

Parcels of Land Set Aside: 10 parcels and 21 lots.

#### Land Claims and Self Government

Self-government negotiations began in 1993; the First Nation began full negotiations for final land claim and self-government agreements in late 1995.

#### Health Care

Destruction Bay has a community health centre staffed by a nurse practitioner. The health centre operates a daily clinic and provides community health services. The nurse practitioner also provides services to the Burwash Landing health centre, running a clinic three days a week. Emergency services are provided from the Destruction Bay health centre.

#### Social Services

The Kluane First Nation delivers social assistance, elder care, and home care services to its members. Daycare services are available in Burwash Landing. YTG provides social worker services to Burwash Landing and Destruction Bay from Haines Junction.

#### **Other Services**

The Kluane First Nation provides housing to its membership and administers community infrastructure such as water, sewer, local road maintenance, and community recreation, in Burwash Landing. There is a Roman Catholic church in Burwash Landing, with a small attached museum.

#### Police/ Fire

The RCMP serves Burwash Landing and Destruction Bay from the Haines Junction detachment. Probation officer and native courtworker services are provided from Whitehorse. Burwash Landing has a new fire hall. The fire service is run by volunteers who have a fire truck and access to well water.


